Students: This program is a personal resource to the college and career process. Through a series of weekly video modules, worksheets and assessments CAPS provides all the essential steps to find, enroll, and receive financial aid and support for the post-secondary process. Cass C. Wright M.S.



Cass C. Wright M.S., CEO of Virtual Readiness Counselors works tirelessly on behalf of all high school students and their families. Cass believes that all students should have the opportunity to attend some form of post-secondary education. Cass further believes that all parents and mentors should be given the correct information to make sound decisions.

This belief began during the more than a decade that Cass spent as an assistant middle and high school principal/behavior specialist with the Erie School District. As the number of counselors dwindled over the years, and students weren't getting the help they needed,

Cass developed Pathways to Post-Secondary Education. It was a program of study designed to give students the information they needed to attend some form of post-secondary education with complete funding in hand.

Not only did Cass give students a Program of Study, but he was also there to assist with their transition to post-secondary education upon graduation.

Prior to being recruited by the Erie School District as an Assistant Principal, Cass served 5 years as the Program Coordinator/Counselor for the Greater Erie Community Action Committee (GECAC) where he exposed thousands of low income and first generation college bound students and their families to the world of higher education.

The following information was gathered by Cass C. Wright CEO of CAPS (Counselors Advantage Program for Success). The information in this report comes from high school students who engaged in the CAPS program for the academic years of 2011-2016.

A few of Cass's duties and responsibilities included: providing guidance, counseling and motivation for program participants in the assigned schools within the City of Erie School District, in addition to planning routine and special events for students such as recruitment sessions, orientation, college fairs, and financial aid workshops.

Cass's Schooling, Organizations, and Awards include:

- B.S. in Education, Gannon University
- Master's in Education, Edinboro University
- Program Coordinator of the GECAC Educational Talent Search Program
- During his time as coordinator, he assisted 1,300 Erie School District students with the post-secondary process and the students that used the program were awarded over 15 million dollars in Federal State and institutional aid.
- Cass has helped over 1,500 students earn more than \$40 million dollars in Federal, State and institutional aid in order to attend some form of post-secondary education.

820 high school students participated in more than 30 individual and group workshops from grades 9th – 12th and utilized information from CAPS through the guidance of Mr. Wright. The workshops took place in Rural, Urban, and Suburban School District's. At the end of the year, each student completed an online Survey Monkey to complete the data portion of the program.
